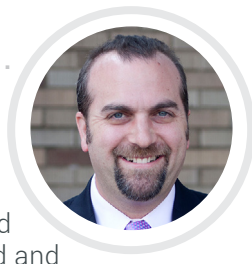

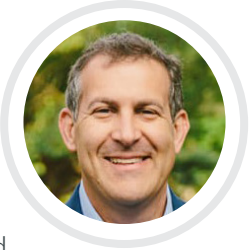

It is where I became a bar mitzvah and have celebrated with my family and friends when my sons were called to the Torah for the first time. Our shul is where I feel comfortable leading a service, reading Torah, and chanting a Haftorah. Tifereth is a special place where many, many of my memories have been made.

Tifereth Israel is a special community. It is more than bricks and mortar. It is a congregation of people with a common interest. A kehillah who feels it is important to be connected with our past, our present and create a warm Jewish environment for our future. Tifereth is where I come to find comfort and peace when I want to sense a spiritual connection to my Judaism.

It is hard to always be prepared for trying times, but when they have occurred in my life, my shul has always been there. When my father passed away, it was Rabbi Skolnik, who had been in Columbus less than a month, standing by my family's side. Along with Rabbis Berman and Braver and Cantor Chomsky, the shul's "support staff," did just that, provided the much-needed support that one seeks in troubling times. They were there when I needed them to be, and for that, I am tremendously grateful.

I love Tifereth because I value the relationship I have with this community, our community. It is comforting to know that Tifereth is here, in both good times and bad, and will be for future generations to come.

Life & Legacy in Practice

Lately, I've been thinking about my namesake, Laura Gelernter Ratner. My parents ignored the Jewish tradition of naming your child after someone who passed away. They named me Laura while my grandmother was still alive and kicking. I was always "Little Laura" and grandma was "Big Laura." I knew I was special in her eyes, and I'm sure having the same name was a big part of that.

Grandma had a hard life. My grandfather Abe owned a construction company in East Orange, New Jersey. When he passed away suddenly at a young age, grandma had big decisions to make. How was she going to support her five children? Should she sell the company? Should she hire someone to run it? Nope. She chose to run the company as its president during the middle of the Depression, all by herself. She not only succeeded in growing the company, but she thrived in this role. This was the woman who remembered every card that was played during gin rummy and bridge. Her intelligence and wit could not be outmatched.

When Grandma Laura passed away in 1983 at age 81, we set up the Laura Ratner Fund in her memory. The fund provides interest-free loans to Jewish women who need assistance to secure an education to enable them to become self-supporting. Many Jewish women have found career success as a beneficiary of this fund. When my mom, Sheiala Ratner Moskow, passed away at age 69 in 1998, we set up a similar scholarship fund in her memory. That means there are now more women in this country who are set up for success. It gives me great nachas to know that the legacies of my grandma and mom are making a difference.

After mom passed, I became the administrator of grandma's fund as well as the one we set up in mom's name. Lately, I've been reviewing all the recipients and what they were able to achieve with this extra boost. I realized that I want to carry on this family tradition by leaving a legacy as well. As a serial nonprofit administrator for over 40 years, I've become knowledgeable about planned giving. My husband Jerry and I have life insurance policies that will eventually go to our daughter Becca. It would be nice if we also give back to our community as well. What would be the best way for us to achieve this?

This brings me to the Life & Legacy Program. It's the planned giving program that is being implemented by Jewish agencies across the U.S. Isn't it time to declare our commitment to help sustain Columbus's Jewish organizations and synagogues for generations to come? Will you join me in making a pledge as part of your estate planning? I would love to sit down with you and talk about what a difference you and your family can make in the lives of so many in our Jewish community. I hope that you will reach out to me to set up a time to get together (socially distanced, of course). I'm sure many of you already have estate plans in place. It would be so simple to add a beneficiary to what you already have. Or you can look at adding a policy specifically designated to the synagogue or agency of your choice. With your help, we can watch the future of Congregation Tifereth Israel and the Columbus Jewish community be solidified for decades to come. L'Shanah Tovah! May you go into 5781 with renewed strength and a mind towards the future.

SCHOLAR IN RESIDENCE

How to Read the Bible
January 23-24, 2021
Marc Brettler. Ph.D.

Marc Brettler is the Bernice and Morton Lerner Distinguished Professor of Jewish Studies in the Department of Religious Studies at Duke University. The Dora Golding Professor of Biblical Studies Emeritus and former chair of the Department of Near Eastern and Judaic Studies at Brandeis University, he has also taught at Yale University, Brown University, Wellesley College, and Middlebury College. A graduate of Brandeis University, he has published and lectured widely on metaphor and the Bible, the nature of biblical historical texts, and gender issues and the Bible.

He is co-editor of the Jewish Study Bible, first published by Oxford University Press in 2004. His *How to Read the Bible* (Jewish Publication Society), which has been called “an eye-opening journey through a familiar text, a fresh look at an old story,” was the award winner in the Judaism category of the Best Books 2006 Book Awards. He is co-editor with Amy-Jill Levine of *The Jewish Annotated New Testament* (Oxford University Press), the first book of its type, which was written up in the New York Times, and has just been republished in an expanded, highly revised version. His most recent book, with Amy-Jill Levine, is *The Bible With and Without Jesus: How Jews and Christians Read the Same Stories Differently*, just published by Harpers. He has written for The Forward and The Jerusalem Report, has appeared on the Television series “Mysteries of the Bible,” was heard on the National Public Radio show “All Things Considered,” and was interviewed on “Fresh Air” by Terry Gross.

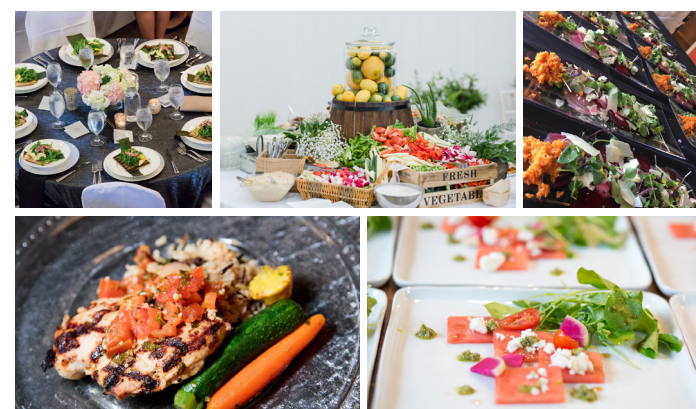

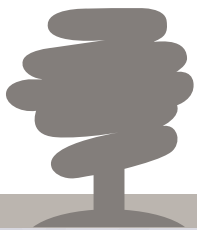
