Two Types of Antisemitism

According to Dara Horn, our onceand-future Scholar-In-Residence (her January appearance was delayed due to Omicron but has been rescheduled for April 1-2.) there are two types of antisemitism: Purim antisemitism and Chanukah antisemitism.

The Purim variety is easy to identify. As she writes: "The goal is openly stated and unambiguous: Kill all the Jews." Haman, twirling his dastardly mustache of it in the Passover story. Though and adorned in his tricorn hat, is a villain so overt and one-dimensional that he is almost comical, a caricature of those who sought to destroy us before him, and an exaggerated archetype of the many who would follow. His plot is so overt, and his reversal of fortunes so swift, that we can release the tension of centuries of built-up trauma by laughing at his expense, drowning out his name with graggers, and eating cookie-fied versions of his hat (or as Israelis call them – oznei Haman, or "Haman's ears".)

Of course, we have to take antisemitism seriously ... and we do. We've spent countless hours reviewing our security procedures, in partnership with our staff and lay leaders, JewishColumbus and the Jewish Community Relations Council, and the Columbus Police. But we hope you'll join us as we celebrate Purim in-person this year, because even when antisemitism seems more present and virulent than ever, we can still celebrate our joy by mocking those who would take it away from us.

But I'm also thinking about Horn's "Chanukah antisemitism" - trickier to identify and somehow more insidious. That other version of antisemitism, "whose appearances range from the Spanish inquisition to the Soviet regime," is not about killing all the Jews, according to Horn. Instead, she writes, it's about: "simply destroying Jewish civilization, while leaving the warm, de-Jewed bodies of its former practicioners intact ... merely

requiring that its

Jews publicly flush thousands of years of Jewish civilization down the toilet in exchange for the worthy prize of not being treated like dirt, of not being murdered. For a few years. Maybe."

Though Chanukah is Horn's paradigm for this second, more insidious type of antisemitism, we see hints the Biblical text focuses on the backbreaking, spirit-crushing labor imposed by the Egyptians, the ancient rabbis — perhaps reflecting on the pressures they themselves faced as Jews living under Roman rule — also understood that there were other forces working surreptitiously against our ancestors. In early rabbinic sources, the rabbis discuss not only the drowning of Hebrew baby boys and the degradations of enslavement, but also the more subtle pressure the Egyptians exerted on their slaves to give up the uniqueness of their own culture: their names, their language, and their values. They understood that oppression can exist both on the surface and beneath the surface at the same time.

The Haggadah itself is an incredible and successful example of resistance to this second type of antisemitism. By telling and retelling the story, and by experiencing it as if we ourselves had been there, we join generations of Jews who have found the strength not to "publicly flush thousands of years of Jewish civilization down the toilet" in the face of unbelievable odds.

Living a Jewish life with pride, holding fast to our values, and dedicating ourselves to study and acts of kindness and justice — these are all also ways of standing against antisemitism. We hope in the coming months you'll stand with us, as you always have.

Tifereth Israel Constitution Revision Committee

In my most recent Forum article, I shared with everyone some of what the Tifereth Israel Board does at its monthly meetings. We of course hear and review reports from our treasurer regarding the financial operations of the synagogue, listen to and often comment on reports from our clergy and staff, as well as listen to updates on security, fundraising, and membership issues.

One of the more recent items of business has been the presentation to the board of the activities of our Constitution Revision Committee. This most recent iteration of reviewing and revising our constitution began about two years ago when former president Ron Solove asked me to assemble a committee to review and to revise the Tifereth Israel Constitution.

Members of this hardworking committee are areas that need to be improved. include Doug Segerman, Jenni Goldson, David Stein, Marty Rosenthal, Leslie Rosen, Jan Lyddon, Rabbi Skolnik, and me, and were chosen in part because of the legal, financial, historical, and humanistic perspective they brought to the discussion. I will add that I am deeply appreciative of each member's contributions.

While there have been a number of constitutional items reviewed, I would like to highlight a few of the major items. They include:

- What constitutes a family? For many years there was a mostly agreedupon definition what a person's family and household was. Today, that has broadened and the committee agreed that our constitution should reflect that.
- What should our board and officer structure and make-up look like? We have currently grown to approximately 50 board members and while we appreciate the contributions of all of them, this simply is not the most efficient way to manage an organization of our current size.

- What should the nominating process be for our board and officers? It is important that we have a representative sample of our entire congregation and that we utilize the experience, skillset, and perspective that each board member brings. Additionally, it would be helpful and wise to have better leadership development processes in effect.

Please understand, the motivation for a revision of our constitution is to allow for a more effective, efficient, and productive board which ultimately is committed to the best long-term relationship our congregants have with Congregation Tifereth Israel. Our current constitution has not been changed for over 60 years and while the essence of it remains vital, there

In fact, there will be no changes to our current constitution without a vote from our congregation. Our current constitution requires two readings of the proposed changes and ultimately a congregational vote to accept. We are tentatively planning on our first reading and discussion on the date of our Congregational Annual Meeting in May and a second discussion a short time later. I invite you personally to reach out to me and share your thoughts as we continue our discussion.

I'm sort of a strange fit for Tifereth Israel. I didn't grow up as part of the congregation. I was raised Reform. I'm in an interfaith marriage. I live all the way over in Upper Arlington! But when my husband and I moved to Columbus back in 2014, I wasn't looking for a shul that checked specific boxes in terms of location or denomination. I was looking for a spiritual home for myself and, most importantly, my children.

You will have the option of choosing from four species:

Tulip Tree (Yellow Poplar) *Liriodendron* Features large yellow flowers, is fast-growing, and likes moist soils. Max. height: 60-90 feet; width: 30-50 feet.

Black Cherry *Prunus Serotina*This tree is fast-growing. Max height: 50-80 feet; width: 30-60 feet.

Spicebush *Lindera Benzoin*This bordering shrub has yellow flowers, grows in shade to full sun, and is excellent for wildlife. Max. height: 6-12 feet.

Common Serviceberry Amelanchier Arborea

This shrub has white flowers, is an excellent wildlife host, has small edible purple fruit, and prefers sun. Max. height: 16-39 feet.

Background

In 1998 in Whitwell, TN, a group of middle school students were learning about the Holocaust and struggling to grasp the concept of the number of Jews who died in it. They decided to collect 6 million paper clips, one for each soul who perished. Paper clips began pouring in from across their community, the state, the nation, and eventually from around the world. They even received an authentic German railcar that had been used to transport the Jews from the ghettos to concentration camps. In 2001, they dedicated a Children's Holocaust Memorial and filled a portion of the railcar with some of the 30 million paper clips they had eventually received. The story of their project became both a book and documentary. Fast forward to 2014, a local 10th Grade WWII history class began their own paper clip project based off of what the Whitwell, TN students had done.
